Ice On Fire.

The Frankston Photographic Club competition for October 2018 is Elements. The competition description is:

October - The 5 Basic Elements (Earth, Fire, Metal, Wood & Water) The image has to have at least two of the above elements as the main subject or any combination of the 5. Earth: has to be in a solid state (rock, soil, sand, etc) Fire: must show flames or the destruction fire can create Water: must be shown in a liquid or frozen state Metal: in its original state or as a finished product or anything in between Wood: any type of wood in its original state or worked on by human hands

This Photoshoot will focus on Ice and Fire

We will use this photoshoot for developing Story Telling through your image(s).

An Idea:

- Centenary of [Armistice Day \(Wikipedia\)](#) this year in November. 2018.11.11
- A row of Bullets made of ice on Fire. Lit from underneath like an optic fibre. Black background. Maybe some ice crosses and ice numbers to represent 100 years.
- What else can you think of..?? Bring it along and we'll see what we can do...
